British society was divided into different social classes: the upper class, the middle class, and the working class. Industrialization and Urbanization The 19th century saw rapid industrialization, transforming Britain into an urbanized nation. Word War 1: Trigger of WW1 The assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand Austria-Hungary declared war on Serbia, The End of WW1 The war ended on November 11, 1918, with the signing of the Armistice between the Allies and Germany. The Treaty of Versailles was signed in 1919, imposing harsh penalties on Germany and shaping the post-war world. Trigger of WW2 Leader of Germany, Adolf Hitler, had plans to take over other countries. In March 1938, Germany invaded and annexed Austria, which made other countries worried. On 29th September 1938, British, French, German and Italian leaders signed a treaty called the Munich Agreement. This allowed Hitler to annex the Sudetenland (an area of Czechoslovakia) if he agreed not to invade anywhere else. However, in August 1939, Hitler broke the agreement and invaded the rest of Czechoslovakia, followed by Poland on 1st September. Britain, France and Poland had made a			World War II occurred from 1939 to 1945 Governments played a crucial role in guiding their countries through the war. Leaders such as Winston Churchill (United Kingdom), Franklin D. Roosevelt (United States), and Joseph Stalin (Soviet Union) made important decisions during the conflict. Allies The Allies were countries fighting together against the Axis powers. Key Allied countries were: • United Kingdom • United States • Soviet Union (now Russia and other independent nations) • China • France (after its liberation in 1944) Axis Powers The Axis powers were the countries opposing the Allies. Major Axis countries were: • Germany (under Adolf Hitler) • Italy (under Benito Mussolini) • Japan Social Impact • The world wars led to a significant loss of life, leaving families and communities devastated. • Women played crucial roles in the workforce during the wars, leading to increased support for women's rights.			Both wars had severe economic repercussions for Britain, with heavy debts and economic challenges after WWI. However, the demand for wartime production and post-war reconstruction provided a way for economic growth and welfare measures after WWII. Technological Advancements World War II, in particular, led to significant technological advancements in areas like aviation, radar, and computing. Key Sources: 			Patriotism and National Identity: The British people believed in the importance of defending their country against Nazi aggression. National symbols like the Union Jack and the British Royal Family were important representations of unity and resilience. Churchill's Leadership: Winston Churchill, as the Prime Minister, played a crucial role in shaping public beliefs and morale during the war. The Home Front and Sacrifice: The concept of the "Home Front" emphasized the importance of civilians' contributions to the war effort. Rationing, air raid shelters, blackout measures, and other sacrifices were embraced to support the troops and protect the nation. Propaganda and Media: The British government employed propaganda to maintain public support and boost morale. Posters, radio broadcasts, and films emphasized the importance of unity and resilience during challenging times. Tolerance and unity were encouraged to build a stronger nation. Remembering the Fallen: Remembrance Day (Poppy Day) became a significant event to honor the fallen soldiers and civilians who lost their lives during the war.
